Pape, an unwarranted interpretation. The City had argued that the complaint was properly dismissed because (1) it was not a "person," and (2) it was entitled to immunity. In an argument in the nature of a rebuttal, the petitioners referred to the doctrine of respondeat superior as an alternative basis for supporting the conclusion that the City is a person. In Part II of petitioners' brief in Monroe, which addressed the doctrine of immunity, petitioners argued that "all doubts as to the liability of the City under the act should be resolved in petitioners' favor." support of that position they specifically argued: "This case portrays a standard police procedure -- whose victims are often innocent. This case is, among other things, a 'custom or usage' case." See xeroxed page 42 attached. It seems to me that the Court must either overrule Monroe v.
